



HISTORY

A century can seem like a long time to some, not so long to others. How do we measure the passage of time? By the pages ripped from a calendar, by gray hairs and swelling paunches, by births and deaths? These certainly are some ways. Photographs reveal the gray, record the christenings, remind us of people who are no longer here. But they do not tell us where we are going. We must measure our time by our "progress". The following brief history testifies the progress made by St. Wendelin Church during the past century.

In the beginning, that is, those years prior to 1870, Catholic pioneers of this vicinity assembled at the home of Dionysius Bear to assist at Mass whenever an itinerant missionary came along. Father Ignatius Balluff, pastor of St. Joseph, Freeport, was the first priest whose visits are recorded.

In 1870 the Catholic Community of Shannon bought a no longer used Presbyterian church building. Father Francis Nighe, who had charge of Fulton and Morrison and spent time in Savanna, came to Shannon one Sunday afternoon to arrange to hold services for us.

Father Anthony Buetter came August 15, 1881 and remained thirty-two years. The old church, becoming inadequate, was replaced by a new 40' x 60' structure at an approximate cost of \$6,000 in 1884, and solemnly dedicated by Archbishop P. A. Feehan, D.D.. Twenty years later the building was destroyed by fire. A new frame church, the present structure, was built in 1906 and dedicated to St. Wendelin. Father Buetter also bought a rectory and land for a beautiful cemetery adjoining the Village to the West of town. Father Buetter was forced to resign because of ill health, went to the Alexian Brothers Hospital, Chicago in 1913, where he died Jan. 6, 1914 and was buried in St. Boniface Cemetery.

The next pastor, Father Stephen Wolfgangarten, came in 1913, transferred to Sterling in 1914. He was succeeded by Father Theodore McCormick. Father Carol Ostenkoetter became pastor for a short time, being replaced Aug. 15, 1916 by Father John Clifford who attended the parish from Freeport. Father Clifford had taught school, later was a fireman on the Burlington Railroad, then studied for the priesthood, being ordained in the Rockford Diocese June 12, 1913. While in Freeport he was Chaplain at St. Vincent Orphanage. Father Clifford moved to Shannon in July, 1917 and served the parish until Oct. 4, 1929 when failing health forced him to retire. He died in St. Joseph Home, Freeport, Sept. 5, 1957, and is buried in St. Wendelin Cemetery.

When Father Clifford retired, Bishop Hoban attached the parish as a mission to St. Mary's Parish, Polo. Pastors at Polo who attended Shannon were: Father John Hackett, 1929-1930; Father Joseph Blitsch, 1930-1939; and Father C. Alfred Dietsch, 1939-1945. In 1945 the mission was transferred to St. Catherine Parish, Freeport. The pastor there, Father Joseph Tully, served the parish until 1948 when Bishop Boylan assigned Father Peter Watgen, Chaplain at St. Francis Hospital, to St. Wendelin. In 1953 Bishop Hillinger restored St. Wendelin to the status of a parish with Father Watgen the pastor. Father "Pete" served the parish for 18 years. In 1959 a basement was added to the building, providing a hall, kitchen and bathroom facilities, as well as the installation of a new oil furnace. Father Watgen celebrated the Silver Jubilee of his ordination to the priesthood in 1956. During these years the Mass and church was experiencing a change, and the first Mass using the table facing the people was used Easter Sunday of 1966. Because of poor health Father Watgen retired in 1967 and lives at St. Vincent, Freeport.

Father Wm. P. Knott was appointed pastor in 1967 by Bishop Loras T. Lane. Father Knott, born in Elgin, graduated from St. Edward High School. After three years at St.

Meinrad College in Indiana, he was assigned by Bishop Boylan to prepare for the priesthood at the University of Louvain in Belgium. He was ordained June 29, 1959 in the American College Chapel. After some parish work Father Knott was assigned by Bishop Lane to do graduate work at the Gregorian University in Rome in 1965, where he received his M. A. in Theology. Aug. 9, 1966 he was named Director of the Diocese of Rockford Post-Conciliar Center to implement and coordinate the decrees of the Second Vatican Council. Our church was completely renovated and remodelled, which when completed was blessed by Bishop Arthur J. O'Neill March 16, 1969. Father Knott is a member of the Rockford Ministerial Ass'n., and currently President of the Rockford Diocese Priest Senate. Father Knott was assigned Chaplain of the Newman Centers at Rockford College and Rock Valley College in June, 1970.

Father William P. Collins was appointed pastor June 3, 1970 by Bishop O'Neill, and formally installed by Rev. Henry Weckerlee, Dean of the Freeport Deanery, Sunday, June 7. Father Collins was born in Chicago, attended Quigley Preparatory Seminary, studied for the priesthood at St. Mary of the Lake Seminary in Mundelein and St. Procopius Seminary in Lisle. He was ordained in 1956. He is Director of the Catholic Inner-City Ministry in Rockford and Spiritual Director of the Cursillo Movement for the Rockford Diocese in addition to his work at St. Wendelin. In this year of 1970 we have completed a C. C. D. building to accommodate instructions of our children and adults.

Our present community numbers close to 100 families residing in the environs of Lanark, Forrester, and Shannon – the result of Bishop Lane broadening the church boundaries. The parish is alive, with many activities centered around our church. Our Lay Consultants are: John Appelt, Wayne Carbaugh, and Norbert Dunkel. Building Committee Co-chairmen are: Joseph Stevens and Robert Lehne. Parish Council Committee Chairmen are: Administration, Richard Stevens (church treasurer); Community Affairs, Mrs. Frank Mack; Education, Mrs. John Kightlinger; Liturgy, Mrs. Francis Engles, Altar Society President, Mrs. Raynor Mosher; Head Usher, John Manning; Church Secretary, Mrs. Howard Griffith.

Those who have lived and worked through these years may remember many other things that could and should have been mentioned here. We can only remember and thank them as a group for giving of themselves and to our church. Families who have been prominent in building and promoting our Catholic Community throughout the years include the names of Barron, Bear, Gabriel, Kraker, Reddington, Roche, Schauer, Spengler, Stevens, Thometz, Wicke, etc. Many of their heirs are among our present parishioners. Christ Gabriel, our oldest member, born in 1886 has received five sacraments, Baptism, Confirmation, Holy Eucharist, Penance, and Matrimony. Four active generations are represented by John Mosher, Sr., also born in 1886. Families attending with three generations include Walter Stevens, Howard Griffith, Peter Kuntz, and Ellen Byrne families. Rose Marie Kersey is a descendent of the Wicke family.

As for the future, what is our goal? A continual formation of a Catholic community with all it entails. Our priests and parishioners have ably met this goal and will continue to do so with God's help.

Perhaps there is no such thing as a "last frontier" – just new ones we haven't come against before. In 1960 Pope Paul said "Development is the new name of peace". Yet development comes slowly, and on its own terms. The past century brought sharply into focus the things we need for simple survival – interior peace, harmony with each other, freedom from deprivation. The issues and problems we have found were not of our choosing. The coming century, perhaps decade, will be a time of choosing: life or death. The younger generation is the best ever. To you who are members of this generation, you are challenged to "do your own thing" in a positive way that adds to the greatness of our church, community, and country – a greatness that was built out of persons with ideals that were positive and that has made our Church what it is today.





VARIOUS ITEMS APPEARING IN FREEPORT AND SHANNON NEWSPAPERS CONCERNING ST. WENDELIN'S

The "Freeport Bulletin", Feb. 22, 1881 – HANDSOME BELL

The St. Wendelin Roman Catholic Church of Shannon has just been provided with a handsome bell, made expressly for it.

Freeport "Daily Journal and Republican", Aug. 4, 1883 CORNERSTONE CEREMONY.

Tomorrow the cornerstone of the new Roman Catholic Church at Shannon will be dedicated with appropriate ceremonies.

Aug. 10, 1883 – CHURCH TO COST \$6,000.00

The new church the Shannon Roman Catholics are to have is to be 40 x 60 feet, and its estimated cost is said to be about \$6,000.00

Oct. 10, 1883 – SHANNON FAIR

There is to be a fair held at Shannon, commencing on the 13th of November, for the benefit of the Catholic Church at that place. The fair and festival is held at the Opera House.

Nov. 16, 1883 – FESTIVAL GRAND SUCCESS

The Fair that is being held at Shannon for the benefit of the new Catholic Church at that place is a grand success. Each evening since the opening the attendance has been large, many Freeporters are taking in the fair.

Freeport Evening Standard, Oct. 9, 1905

SHANNON CATHOLIC CHURCH DESTROYED BY FIRE SATURDAY

Fire destroyed the Catholic Church at Shannon Saturday afternoon entailing a loss of \$8,000 with an insurance of \$3,500. When first discovered the belfry was ablaze, having caught from a spark from a bonfire in the street. It was seen from the first that the church was doomed and after removing what furniture they could the crowd gave attention to saving the adjoining buildings. A strong wind from the Southwest was blowing at the time which carried the sparks several blocks. Everything being so dry, in less than an hour the fire had completed its work. Great credit is due the citizens who worked so heroically to keep the flames from spreading. In all probability the church will be rebuilt in the near future.

Friday, July 27, 1906

The new Catholic Church at Shannon will be completed in about three weeks.

CATHOLIC CHURCH TO BE USED NEXT SUNDAY, AUGUST 26TH

It is now expected that the new Catholic Church at Shannon will be ready for occupancy for the first time on Sunday, August 26th. This is one of the prettiest and best arranged churches in the country anywhere.

CATHOLIC CHURCH AT SHANNON DEDICATED TODAY

Archbishop Quigley of Chicago was in the city last night, the guest of Rev. Father Kalvelage at St. Joseph's parish house. He left this morning, accompanied by several of the local priests, for Shannon where he today dedicated the new St. Wendelin Catholic Church. There were a great many other Catholic clergymen present at the dedication. St. Wendelin's church was destroyed by fire about two years ago, the flames from a bonfire started near the edifice igniting it. It was rebuilt last year. Rev. Father Bueter is the pastor, having served very successfully in the parish for many years past. Incidental to the dedication of the church, the archbishop confirmed a class of children and adults.

ST. WENDELIN'S CHURCH SUNDAY ON "SILVER JUBILEE"




